

SNBT Supports the Progression of the Community

The Stephenson National Bank & Trust (SNBT) has a long history of aiding the needs of local non-profits, whether it be providing rent-free office space, teaching financial lessons, volunteering countless hours, or making monetary donations.

“SNBT truly believes in not only developing lifelong banking relationships, but also in doing good things for the people in the communities we serve,” said Daniel J. Peterson, SNBT President and CEO.

That’s why each year, SNBT makes monetary donations to non-profits in Marinette, Menominee, and Oconto Counties. The number of yearend donation recipients totaled 47 organizations, and 2017 contributions amounted to over \$180,000. Below are a few personal stories from donation recipients describing how they plan to use the funds to enhance health and education for children in our communities.

Crivitz Rescue Squad plans to use their contribution towards a new rescue squad vehicle. The Crivitz Rescue members pride themselves at keeping their equipment up to date and working for when they get a call. The purchase of a new rescue squad vehicle will replace their older, 2012, rescue squad. As protocols change and new equipment becomes available, space has become an issue. Crivitz Rescue is able to customize the new squad to make patient care more accessible and comfortable while still holding to state regulations.

Pembine-Dunbar-Beecher Rescue Squad has used the current and past donations to purchase and train their members with the equipment and skills necessary to serve the community. This year’s donation has been applied to the purchase of two new ZOLL AEDs that have replaced older AEDs in their ambulance.



Rainbow House Domestic Abuse Services, Inc. is using to SNBT’s donation to help survivors of domestic violence in the community. Victims come to The Rainbow House with problems for which they do not have a specific fund. Their needs are great

and varied. Examples might include the need for an auto repair so a survivor can get to work, the desire to see a dentist for a tooth knocked loose by abuser, or the wish for a birthday gift for a child in the shelter.

Healthy Youth Coalition (HYC) has brought the “ACTion Troupe” program to local schools to spread the message about drug and alcohol prevention and anti-bullying education. HYC used SNBT’s donation this past year to host High Intensity Drug Trafficking Agent (HIDTA), Kevin Wong, from Colorado to come to our community and educate residents on what has happened to the state of Colorado since the recreational legalization of marijuana. This presentation, along with many more HYC programs, have helped members spread the drug-free message to residents in the local community.



CYI Teen Center used SNBT’s donation to purchase new bowling pins for their bowling alley. The CYI Teen Center offers an after school youth bowling program through Community Ed. They have family bowling on Saturdays from 3 p.m. to 9 p.m. and Sundays 12 p.m. to 6 p.m. and open community bowling on Mondays from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. October through April.

Greater M&M YMCA used their contributions to initiate the Coordinated Approach to Child Health (CATCH) Programs into their After School Concept. The CATCH Program is ran by trained staff members, and involves physical activity and teaching children eating portions such as the whoa, slow and go foods.

Wausaukee Enterprises, Inc. plans to use the monetary donations to purchase a 2018 Ford passenger van. As part of their support services, Wausaukee Enterprises provides daily transportation for their employees to work. Along with that they use vans for a variety of outings throughout the area including Museums, Packer Hall of Fame, Parks, Zoo, Laona Steam Train, Wausaukee Bowl, Crivitz Community Center and most recently “Ringing Bells” for Salvation Army.

The Oconto Historical Society is dedicated to preserving, and educating the public about the history of Oconto County. They operate three museums: The Beyer Home & Carriage Museum (five building complex) and the Copper Culture Museum at the Copper Culture State Park in Oconto, along with the Holt-Balcom Logging Camp Museum in Lakewood. The Society uses SNBT’s funds sponsors numerous events, programs, and activities during the calendar year which are open to the public.
